THE DEPARTMENT

The Treasurer-Tax Collector is responsible for collecting and processing property tax payments and investing and keeping safe monies and securities for the County and other public entities.

The investments generate interest earnings to the County and the agencies depositing monies with the Treasury.

THE POSITION

The Chief Deputy Treasurer is primarily responsible for managing investable County, school district, and special district funds which are deposited into the County Treasury, and ensuring their security, liquidity, and yield in a manner consistent with the County Treasurer-Tax Collector's investment policies. The position also assists the Treasurer-Tax Collector and Assistant Treasurer-Tax Collector by providing senior-level administrative and managerial support for other department operations as needed. In all assignments, the incumbent is expected to model a strong work ethic and leadership skills, including accountability to oneself and others.

Typical duties include the following:

- Executes daily investment transactions ensuring timely settlement of all trades; ensures that all maturity proceeds and periodic interest due are accurately calculated and credited to County bank accounts.
- Prepares cash flow projections and analyses to determine investable cash and/or operating cash needs; ensures that County bank accounts have sufficient cash balances to meet cash disbursements.
- Monitors and manages treasury activities and department banking arrangements; reviews account information provided by Treasury staff; analyzes financial data and reports; reviews and analyzes school and special district bond and TRANS documents; studies economic and financial trends and money market conditions to determine various investment opportunities for temporarily idle funds.
- Keeps informed on current conditions in the capital/credit markets, the projected direction of interest rates, and on legal requirements relating to County investment matters; reviews and analyzes proposed and existing legislation which regulates the investment of public funds, and makes recommendations as to policy implications for the County.
- Prepares periodic investment reports to the Board of Supervisors and the Treasury Oversight Committee.
- Serves as a liaison between the Treasury, other County departments, state and local agencies, and the general public; communicates with banks and security dealers in order to be aware of interest rates and special investment opportunities.

Over 75 languages are spoken within the region and there is richness in the blending of cultures and ways that creates an air of celebration about individual customs, foods and cultures. San Joaquin County government provides nine community parks for boating, camping, and picnicking, swimming and organized sports. Annual family events include the Asparagus Festival, attended by thousands of fun-seekers from the county and beyond, held in downtown Stockton.

Individual cities and communities provide a host of other opportunities, from Lodi Lake Park and Nature Area to the Woodbridge Ecological Reserve. The county-owned and operated Micke Grove Park offers a zoo, rides and an historical museum to delight both children and adults. The San Joaquin Delta is one of the area's best kept secrets and offers some of the best boating in the state: more than 1,000 miles of waterways stretching from the Stockton Harbor to north of Sacramento and offering access to the San Francisco Bay.

AGRICULTURE

The county is one of the most agriculturally rich regions in California and is the number one producer, statewide, of asparagus. Twenty-four thousand acres of county farmland is dedicated to production of this crop. In recent years, the leading crop in the county has been wine grapes, and wineries and vineyards have sprung up from Stockton to Lodi.





EDUCATION

From preschool to higher education, the county has it covered with an abundant array of public or private opportunities to learn and grow. The University of the Pacific, California State University, Stanislaus - Stockton Center, Humphreys College and Law School, National University and the San Joaquin Delta Community College offer a wide variety of choices for educational opportunities.
