About the Position

The San Joaquin County Registrar of Voters Office is seeking an experienced elections professional to manage and supervise the day-to-day activities of the Registrar of Voters (ROV) Office. The incumbent will manage activities involving elections, voter registration and related ROV functions, as well as perform difficult administrative analytical research, financial and administrative managerial support in areas such as budgeting, finance, human resources, procurement and staff development. In all assignments, the ideal candidate is expected to model a strong work ethic and leadership skills, including accountability to oneself and others.

The Department

The Registrar of Voters Office is a division of the County Administrator's Office and is responsible for conducting fair, impartial, accurate, secure and transparent federal, state and local elections. Other functions of the Registrar of Voters Office include voter registration, election administration and campaign finance disclosures. San Joaquin County has approximately 385,000 active registered voters and currently maintains a staff of 30 full-time positions, with seasonal employees hired for each election.

Application and Selection

The competitive process includes submittal of a completed San Joaquin County Employment application and Supplemental Questionnaire. Resumes will not be accepted in lieu of a complete application package. If a formal exam process is utilized, qualified applicants will be invited to participate in an oral examination which may include a practical exercise. The top-scoring candidates will be referred to the department for a hiring interview. To apply, submit a completed application and supplemental questionnaire on or before the final filing date.

Elections Manager

Major Responsibilities Include

- Assists in planning, supervising and coordinating the operations of the ROV office ensuring compliance with applicable laws and regulations and establishing office priorities and organizational goals.
- Directs activities and operations related to federal, state, county, local and special district elections; manages the issuance, acceptance, and certification of petitions and papers filed for public office candidates; oversees the selection and organization of polling places ensuring compliance with federal and state accessibility requirements; manages recount processes as required.
- Directs the mailing of official sample ballots, the ordering of election supplies, assignment of voting machines, and coordination of delivery to inspectors prior to each election.
- Directs precinct and voter registration operations, including the maintenance of precinct records, maps, and other election records; analyzes voter registration information and recommends modifications to voter precincts as appropriate.
- Assigns and directs the work of subordinate staff; monitors and evaluates staff performance; recommends disciplinary action when required.
- Researches and interprets state and federal bulletins on proposed law changes; analyzes the impact of new laws and amendments and recommends/implements new policies and policy revisions.
- Responds to inquiries and/or complaints pertaining to elections, voter registration, and related processes; conducts research as needed to recommend solutions.
- Gives oral presentations to individuals and groups, including schools and civic organizations; directs the preparation and distribution of candidate and voter information materials; directs ROV outreach and education activities.

Minimum Qualifications

<u>Education</u>: Graduation from an accredited four year college or university with a bachelor's degree in public or business administration, political science, social or behavioral science or a closely related field.

<u>Experience</u>: Three (3) years of responsible managerial, fiscal, personnel, or administrative analytical experience, that include at least two years preparing for and administering elections.

<u>Substitution #1</u>: A Master's degree from an accredited college or university in public or business administration, political science, social or behavioral science, or a closely related field may substitute for one year of non-elections experience.

<u>Substitution #2</u>: Additional qualifying experience performing responsible managerial, fiscal, personnel, or administrative analytical work may substitute for the above-required education on a year-for-year basis, to a maximum of two years.

Arts, Culture, and Recreation

The arts and culture provide a much-needed respite from everyday worries and the Haggin Museum, San Joaquin County Historical Museum, and Stockton Children's Museum are popular spots.

The Stockton Symphony, San Joaquin County Ballet, and Stockton Civic Theater provide important experiences for children and adults. The multi-cultural community offers a diversity of views and opinions in its art and culture, providing a wealth of knowledge about past and present on canvas and stage.

There are over 85 wineries within the Lodi Appellation offer opportunities for tasting and special events.

Weekly farmers markets throughout the county offer a cornucopia of fresh fruit and vegetables. Fruit stands and pick-your-own produce farms dot the countryside.
