There are currently position opportunities in the Smoking and Tobacco Outreach/Prevention and Nutrition Education and Obesity Prevention Programs. Desired skills include planning, developing and implementing programs; conducting trainings and presentations; applying program evaluation methods; and grant reporting.

The Public Health Educator is the professional level classification in the series and works with relative independence. Oak Grove Regional Park features one of the last stands of ancient Valley Oak in the northern San Joaquin Valley. The Sandhill Crane Festival is held in Lodi every fall to herald their annual stop along the Pacific Flyway.

The San Joaquin Delta is one of the area's best kept secrets and offers some of the best boating in the state: more than 1,000 miles of waterways stretching from the Stockton Harbor to north of Sacramento and offering access to the San Francisco Bay.
